Wow, what a fantastic first week back we've had! There has been a really industrious atmosphere around the school and I've been really impressed with how quickly children have settled into slightly new routines with their new teachers.

We started the week with an assembly around '**What makes a good learner'.** Working in groups, there was lots of really super discussion. This theme is something that we will be developing this term and embedding into our classroom routines. The top five characteristics chosen by the children so far include: 'curious, reflective, resilient, resourceful and likes a challenge' - great stuff!

On Wednesday, the Year 6s attended an online meeting about 'Sustainability and Climate Education' with several other schools in the Andaras Trust. Again, I was really proud of how confidently all contributed. We have decided that our Year 5s and 6s are going be our 'Sustainability Ambassadors' and, amongst other jobs, are going to be involved in leading a 'youth action' project which promotes sustainability in our school. I'm sure you will be hearing from them soon! We are also going to run a Sustainability club after school on a Wednesday – which will be open to all ages.

Today, in the hope of some sunny days ahead, we had a visit from the RNLI to learn about beach safety. The children made some really well considered contributions to the assembly.

We have a great term ahead with exciting events to look forward to – one of which includes working with Sophie, a local artist who will be working with all the children on a whole school printing project! Huge thanks again to the PTA for contributing to this (and for purchasing books for our Writing scheme!)

## Acorn/Birch Class Update

It's been a fantastic first week back for Acorn and Birch Class! Acorns have started the summer term off with a new approach to their learning! We are making every opportunity an adventure by trying to use our imaginations (described as "lots of pictures floating around in our heads" by Edith) to take us on a journey to wherever we want to go! George made a dragon and put it into a dark cave (the toy microwave) and Nathan made a special golden basket (a plastic container) to store his dragon food (a pile of sticks) in! What great imaginations! We're looking forward to seeing where our adventures might take us over the weekend!

Birch children have been looking for hiding dragons and then using positional language to describe where they found them, such as <u>behind</u> the door, <u>under</u> the table and <u>above</u> the soap, inspired by the book 'The Dragon Machine'.

In maths, Acorns have been building numbers beyond 10 and Birch have been learning about clockwise and anti-clockwise turns.

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### **Chestnuts Class Update**

Mrs Kinver and I have been really impressed with Chestnuts this week. The hook for our new Literacy Tree text, 'The Baker by the sea', started with cooking on Tuesday! This week they've been investigating using persuasive devices in their writing, plus using role play/freeze frames today to develop their understanding of the context of the story. They have written super 1<sup>st</sup> person accounts, using cohesive devices and wonderful detail.

In Maths, we've been looking at angles. (Y3/4 – types of angles and Y5/6 – angles in a line and in a triangle. Check out this website to investigate it more. <u>https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/topics/zb6tyrd</u>

We've also introduced our new History topic, 'Iron-age hill-forts'. We are really looking forward to seeing the children's research on this. This can take any form; a powerpoint, a film, a model, a factsheet.

We have aslo started a new Art focus this week, 'Telling storied through drawings and making'...it's going to be a good one! Today we have been looking at the work of the illustrator; Inbal Leitner and Rosie Hurley – a sculptor.

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# **Online Safety**



Thinkuknow: keeping your child safe online while they are off school

### 8 steps to keep your child safe online this month

- 1. Explore together: Ask your child to show you their favourite websites and apps and what they do on them. Listen, show interest and encourage them to teach you the basics of the site or app.
- 2. Chat little and often about online safety: If you're introducing them to new learning websites and apps while school is closed, take the opportunity to talk to them about how to stay safe on these services and in general. Ask if anything ever worries them while they're online. Make sure they know that if they ever feel worried, they can get help by talking to you or another adult they trust.
- 3. Help your child identify trusted adults who can help them if they are worried: This includes you and other adults at home, as well as adults from wider family, school or other support services who they are able to contact at this time. Encourage them to draw a picture or write a list of their trusted adults.
- 4. Be non-judgemental: Explain that you would never blame them for anything that might happen online, and you will always give them calm, loving support.
- 5. Supervise their online activity: Keep the devices your child uses in communal areas of the house such as in the living room or kitchen where an adult is able to supervise. Children of this age should not access the internet unsupervised in private spaces, such as alone in a bedroom or bathroom.
- 6. Talk about how their online actions affect others: If your child is engaging with others online, remind them to consider how someone else might feel before they post or share something. If they are considering sharing a photo/video of somebody else, they should always ask permission first.
- 7. Use 'SafeSearch': Most web search engines will have a 'SafeSearch' function, which will allow you to limit the content your child can access whilst online. Look out for the 'Settings' button on your web browser homepage, which is often shaped like a small cog.
- Parental controls: Use the parental controls available on your home broadband and all internet enabled devices in your home. You can find out more about how to use parental controls by visiting your broadband provider's website.





### <u>SEN Corner</u>

This month I wanted to share some information on the provision we offer and explain the different levels of support.

This is for all of our children



 Also known as 'quality first teaching' QFT, this is the use of a range of teaching & learning strategies used in class that leads to pupil progress for most learners.

Additional interventions or booster sessions for small groups of learners to support pupils' progress,

 Additional interventions for individual learners or involvement of external agencies (E.g. Ed Psych, Speech therapist, etc.) to support pupils' progress.

Some children will need wave 2 and will be in intervention groups.

Children who require a significant level of support from wave 2 and some wave 3 support which may include external professional support will be on the SEN register and part of the Assess, plan, do, review cycles which happens termly.

Information on support that we provide at each wave is on the school website in the SEN section.
