YouTube

YouTube is intended for users over the age of 13 (however, children of all ages may use the Service and YouTube Kids if enabled by a

What if my child is under the age of 13?

If your child is under the age of 13 then your child should use either YouTube Kids or a Supervised Account. Which option you choose, will depend on your child's age and your requirements.

- YouTube Kids this is a separate app that includes a smaller selection of videos based on the age you select:
 - · Preschool (ages four and under)
 - Younger (ages 5–8)

- Older (ages 9–12)
- **Supervised accounts** this is a parent-managed version of YouTube. You can select one of the following options, again depending on your child's age and your requirements:
 - Explore Generally for viewers aged 9+.
 - Explore more Generally for viewers aged 13+
 - Most of YouTube This setting includes almost everything on YouTube except for videos marked as 18+ and other videos that may not be appropriate for viewers using supervised experiences.

Online safety

How can I make YouTube safer?

- **Explore YouTube together** and see what they like to watch. Make sure your child understands that they can **talk to you** if they see anything that makes them feel uncomfortable online.
- **Restricted mode** is an additional setting (when logged in via a Google account) to restrict the availability of mature content.




February SEN Corner

Welcome to the February SEN corner. This month I would like to share some information on Emotional Coaching. Staff have carried out training on this with our Educational Psychology team.

Emotion coaching is about helping children to become more aware of their emotions and to manage their own feelings particularly if they are dysregulated. Here are some of the strategies we use and that can be used at home.

A quick guide to emotional coaching



There are four steps to emotional coaching.

- 1. Notice the child's feelings and empathise with them.
- Label and validate the feeling the child is experiencing right at that moment.

'I can see that you get angry when that happens. I would feel angry if it happened to me too. It is ok to feel angry'

3. Set Limits (if needed)

Emotional coaching is not about ignoring the fact that some behaviours are not acceptable. After steps 1 and 2 you should be clear which behaviours are not acceptable.

'I understand you are feeling really sad today, but one of our golden rules is kindness, so hitting your friend is not an ok thing to do.'

4. Problem solving

When the child is calm, help the child to consider what they should do when they feel those strong feelings again.



Make a Difference Become a Parent Governor



Why become a Parent Governor?

Governors have an important part to play in helping schools to run effectively. They work as part of a team with the Head of School and school staff to help provide a happy, safe and thriving learning environment and an excellent education for all the children.

As a Parent Governor, you will be well placed to understand parents' views and have first-hand knowledge of how the school is run. You will have the opportunity to work toward improving the school experience not only for your own child but for children in years to come.

This voluntary role can be challenging yet extremely rewarding and is a great way to build on your personal and professional skills. You will be supported in the role through training and mentoring allowing you to use your knowledge and experience to the full extent.

What will you do?

You will work with the Local Governing Body (LGB) to develop the school's vision and priorities, review educational performance and make strategic decisions.

Parent Governors are representative parents rather than representatives of parents. You will not be expected to gather the views of other parents and take them to Governors meetings or to personally become involved in individual concerns. You will need to be able to present a balanced and impartial view, based on the benefits for all children.

Local governor meetings are held three times a year and may be combined with school visits focused on school priorities. You will receive reports from the headteacher and senior leaders and need to be able to question, challenge and support decisions. You will also be expected to visit the school as a governor which can be a quite different experience to visiting as a parent!

The governing body operates a code of conduct which sets an ethos of professionalism and high expectations of governors.

What are we looking for?

We need enthusiastic and committed parents from a variety of backgrounds. You do not need leadership or education experience; just a desire to give back to the school and its community and a proactive approach to becoming involved as a member of a team.
