Acorn/Birch Class Update

Acorns and Birch have had another great week of learning! Acorns have been reading "Lost and Found" and have been retelling the story using props. Birch have written their own versions of "The Sea Saw" and have started to publish these as their own booklet! They have been using words pre-fixed with *un* and adding adjectives to describe nouns.

In maths, Acorns have been finding one more and one less than numbers up to 5 and Birch have been ordering objects and numbers according to their size.

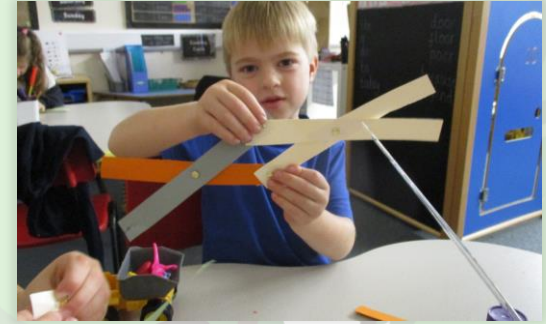
We have been finding out about how penguins are adapted to living in Antarctica and comparing that with the Sahara Desert. Acorns investigated how to make Pip the Penguin waterproof again (after I put him in the washing machine!) They used different types of materials to see which one would keep him dry!

In DT, we made levers and linkages with card and split pins in preparation for our moving monsters!. We have been learning how to take great photos in Computing, deciding whether to choose a portrait or landscape view.

Please remember to choose a reading book to share with your child as often as you like and thank you for listening to your children read at home.

Chestnut Class Update

In English this week, the children have been writing their own legend story. They have invented a semi-aquatic creature to be the main character, who runs away with one of the locals and is set by a beach in Cornwall. The children have used techniques such as fronted adverbials to extend their writing and have used a range of punctuation such as commas and dashes.

In Maths this week, the Yr 3/4 children have had a focus on the times table – Thank you to the families that are helping support the children with this focus. On the other hand, Yr 5/6 children have been continuing to develop knowledge around subtracting fractions. They have converted denominators in order to subtract fractions and have also taken fractions away from the whole.

In Science this week, the Yr 3/4 children have been exploring how the digestive system works and learning the job of each part of the digestive system – our favourite word was oesophagus! Whereas, the Yr 5/6 have investigated the loudness of a buzzer by using a decibel meter and the impact of adding more batteries.

In Music, the Yr 5/6 performed to the rest of the class and Miss Kinver, where they all had different parts and instruments, while singing to the drunken sailor.



What parents need to know about AGE RATINGS

bbfc **PEGI**

If you have children, it is understandable to have concerns about the films and TV shows they watch, as well as the games they play. In this guide, we take a look at the two official ways you can assess if a particular title is suitable for your child. Both the BBFC and PEGI have search facilities on their websites that can be used to look up individual titles so you can check their ratings.

RATINGS FOR FILMS, TV & MUSIC VIDEOS

Since 1912, the BBFC (British Board of Film Classification) has regulated all material of the age category of films, TV and music videos – ensuring parents both the information needed to assess whether or not it is appropriate for their child's age. This applies to cinema releases, DVD and streaming video services such as Netflix.

WHAT ARE THE BBFC RATINGS?

BBFC ratings are broken down into seven age categories:

U Universal Suitable for all ages	PG Parental Guidance Suggested	12 Suitable for persons aged 12 and over	12A Persons aged 12 and over may watch with an adult
15 Suitable for persons aged 15 and over	18 Suitable for persons aged 18 and over	R18 Restricted Persons aged 18 and over may watch with an adult	

WHAT ELSE CAN BBFC REVEAL?

In addition to the age suitability rating, BBFC also provides an additional warning regarding the content and what to expect, such as swearing, sexual content, violence and anything you may consider to be inappropriate for your child. In addition to this, the content is also rated to show levels of frequent, mild or strong.

LIMITATIONS OF BBFC RATINGS

It's important to note that there is no obligation on streaming video services to use or display BBFC ratings. Due to this, we advise that you check the ratings on the website of the service. It may also be a possibility to watch the content first yourself or discuss it with other parents to help you decide whether or not it is suitable for your child.

RATINGS FOR GAMES

PEGI (Pan European Game Information) is a common rating system that most of today's games are labelled with a minimum age recommendation. These age recommendations are based on the types of content that the game contains, such as the presence of violence and profanity, sexual content, gambling, bad language and drugs.

WHAT ARE THE PEGI RATINGS?

PEGI ratings are split into age restrictions and content descriptors. Individual content descriptors help parents and children to understand what the game contains, such as violence, bad language, gambling, sex, drugs, and anything you may consider to be inappropriate for your child. In addition to this, the content is also rated to show levels of frequent, mild or strong.

PEGI age ratings are broken down into five categories:

It's important to note that there is no obligation on streaming video services to use or display PEGI ratings. Due to this, we advise that you check the ratings on the website of the service. It may also be a possibility to watch the content first yourself or discuss it with other parents to help you decide whether or not it is suitable for your child.

PARENTAL CONTROLS

It's a good idea to set up parental controls for all online devices and services, including your smartphone and tablet. The Age-Tools, FamilyShield, and FamilyShield+ apps are available for Android and iOS devices. The FamilyShield app is available for Windows and macOS devices.
