
BUILD YOUR BRIDGE

We all acted out how a seed becomes a plant, and are beginning to see some growth in our little bean seeds that we planted last week for a science experiment.

We finished our beautiful sunflower collage, then painted, snipped, chucked and finger-painted some beautiful flowers out in our sunny garden.

Acorn/Birch Class Update

Acorns and Birch have been enjoying our outdoor space this week, especially our orienteering on Thursday with Birch and lots of outdoor learning with Acorns!

In English, Birch have been using adjectives to describe a character from our new book, *Lost and Found*, and have been adding -ed to the end of verbs to change them to the past tense. They then retold the story so far to a partner, using the past tense verbs. Acorns have been writing some fantastic sentences in Drawing Club, inspired by the *Enormous Turnip* story!

In maths, Acorns have been counting beans to match the numerals and Birch have been finding the correct coins and notes to make an amount of money.

In History, we looked at the timeline to see when Launceston Castle was built and found out about Richard, Earl of Cornwall – ask us what we found out about him and how he played an important role in the history of Launceston!

In Art, we used charcoal and oil pastels to produce some amazing observational drawings of insects, looking closely at their structure.

Chestnut Class Update


During our Maths learning this week, the Yr 3/4 children have started a new topic of decimals, where they were building on previous knowledge to show tenths as a fraction, decimal and on a place value chart. They then explored hundredths and how these are different from tenths.

During their English learning this week, the children used a range of writing techniques such as expanded noun phrases and adverbial starters - to explain the connections between Leila and Miso and the lengths she would go to protect her. The also have focused on using powerful vocabulary, that creates strong, emotive pictures to the reader.

During the Yr 3/4 Science learning, the children continued developing their knowledge regarding circuits and how to make a switch, which they all managed successfully. Whereas, the Yr 5/6 learnt about nutrients and water is carried and absorbed into the body.

We had some really interesting discussions in PSHE, where the children looked at how we can help improve our environment by looking at the seven 'R's'. The Yr 5/6's learnt some valuable lessons on first aid and how to help a friend in need who is having an asthma attack, broken a bone or burnt themselves.

Congratulations to ALL the Yr 6 children, who have done brilliantly this week – they should feel very proud!
